Tech Tip: Don't Trust Your Email

Email is the most frequent source of malicious software on computers we see. Fake links and attachments with viruses hit our spam filters every day, and I'm sure everyone has a friend whose email address has been hacked by now. *All it takes is one wrong click on Invoice1.pdf* to get infected with a new variant of ransomware (viruses that encrypt your files and charge a ransom to unlock access to them). Don't click on an attachment unless you are 100% sure it's legit or you're expecting it. If the tone of the message sounds fishy, call to confirm the authenticity. Never, ever, ever send important information like credit card numbers, social security numbers, client information, etc. over regular email.

Featured Accessory: External Hard Drive Enclosure

External Hard Drive Enclosures are used to make an internal hard drive external by enclosing it in a case. Hard drive enclosures can provide many benefits; one such benefit is giving traditional internal hard drives portability. You can take the hard drive of a non-functioning computer (assuming the HD is fine), and use it externally. Using an external hard drive will also reduce the probability of data loss or data corruption. In addition, data can be backed up and archived on an external hard drive so that it doesn't take up any additional space on your primary hard drive.

Windoes 10 Tip:

Recently many devices have wireless issues with IP not configured showing up on the screen. In these cases, restart the computer, or turn off\(\)on a few times. Usually the connection will come back up without needing to be serviced in shop.
